OMCA Photography Series Launches with Exhibition Showcasing Intimate Views of Living and Working in California's Central Valley

Ken and Melanie Light Show a Photographic Journey of Farm Workers' Lives in California's Agricultural Region

(OAKLAND, CA) June 6, 2012—This July, the Oakland Museum of California will open *Ken and Melanie Light: Valley of Shadows and Dreams*, an exhibition of photographs and written word exploring the harsh truths of the daily experiences of farm workers and their families in California's Central Valley. On view in OMCA's Gallery of California Art, July 28 through December 30, 2012, the exhibition is the first of a three-part series exploring contemporary topics in California through photography.

Featuring 31 black-and-white photographs—on view for the first time in a museum—the exhibition explores major threads in California history and the global issues of our generation: water, land use, immigration and farm labor and growing economic disparity. A photographic exploration of a region known for its agricultural plenty and the marginalization of its people—*Ken and Melanie Light: Valley of Shadows and Dreams* delves deep into the reality of farm workers' daily experiences and investigates the legacies of politics, bureaucracy, and control in the region. In the tradition of great partnerships such as the iconic photographer Dorothea Lange and agricultural economist Paul Taylor, the Lights reveal both the beauty and the callous truths of this important agricultural region in California through photographs and writing.

Providing an intimate look into the lives of migrant workers, the photographs showcase the highs and the lows of daily life—from the devastating results of home foreclosures to the jubilant experience of children on the San Joaquin River enjoying the simple pleasures of a rope swing. Through these photographs, Ken Light captures scenes of hardworking people fighting to preserve their livelihoods and traditions.

"Valley of Shadows and Dreams reveals a world that all Californians should be aware of," said **OMCA Curator of Photography and Visual Culture Drew Johnson.** "Though Ken Light's photographs are as up-to-date as today's headlines, they resonate with echoes of **John Steinbeck**, **Dorothea Lange**, and others in the past who reminded us about the lives of people who grow food for our tables. I'm particularly excited about presenting this new work in a gallery just steps from Lange's photographs."

The exhibition opens in OMCA's Gallery of California Art on Saturday, July 28, and will be on view through Sunday, December 30, 2012. The project is accompanied by the book *Valley of Shadows and Dreams*, published by **Heyday Books** in May 2012, which features an introduction by **Thomas Steinbeck**, more than 100 black-and-white photos by Ken Light, and essays by Melanie Light. The 153-page, hardcover book makes an emotive call to action to encourage change in the way the disenfranchised are viewed by offering an intimate glimpse into their lives. ABOUT THE ARTISTS

Ken Light is a social documentary photographer whose published work includes *Coal Hollow, Witness in Our Time, Texas Death Row, Delta Time, To the Promised Land,* and *With These Hands.* He has exhibited internationally, received numerous grants and awards, and is an adjunct professor and director of the Center for Photography at the University of California, Berkeley. His work has appeared in numerous magazines, including *Rolling Stone, Granta, Time, Newsweek, Mother Jones, The National Journal, Speak, L'Internazionale*, and *Camera Arts.*

Melanie Light is an essayist and author whose most recent work is *Coal Hollow*. Her previous work includes two special-edition books: *Night at the Met*, with photography by Larry Fink, and *Mad Day Out*, featuring photographs of the Beatles. She is the cofounding executive director of Fotovision, a non-profit dedicated to supporting the international community of documentary photographers. She teaches and lectures internationally.

The third exhibition—Peter Stackpole: Bridging the Bay (July 20 – December 2013)—features stunning blackand-white photographs of the San Francisco-Oakland Bay Bridge construction by one of LIFE magazine's first staff photographers.
